Children and Young People's Advocacy. Our advocacy work with children and young people focuses on: children and young people affected by the Children Act 1989 and related legislation, namely those considered 'in need' or who are 'looked after' by a local authority or a young person leaving care; as well as other forms of statutory advocacy that a child or young person may be entitled to, such as Independent Mental Health Advocacy (IMHA) or Independent Advocacy under the Care Act 2014.

Case studies of advocacy campaigns highlight applied approaches to advocacy across a range of issues, including child welfare, disability, early childhood, and education.
