Pruning at planting: head younger canes back to about 24 to 30 cm in length (1) prune off lower, shorter canes (2) At least in the first year after planting the blueberry, it should not be allowed to produce fruit. Early production can prevent the development of plant, resulting in reduced plant yield. Fruit buds should be removed before flowering.

Blueberries produce fruit on canes that are young, strong and upright, rather than on older branches on the bush. Pruning helps to maintain a good shape and size so that the plant is productive. Blueberries that are not pruned develop branches that are crowded and intertwined. This inhibits the fruit from developing.

Pruning an Older Blueberry Bush. The tidy-up comes first. Prune out all the dead, diseased wood. Remove crossing stems and any crossing or particularly spindly-looking branches. Then remove any low branches that will touch the ground when fruit-laden. Blueberries have a shallow, spreading root system and suckers can sprout up some distance from the bush.

Pruning blueberries is essential in order to maintain their size, shape, and productivity. When blueberry plants are not pruned, they can become overgrown masses of weak, leggy growth with small fruit. However, severe pruning can lead to larger berries but fewer in number.

With a little care, your blueberry plants will continue to produce abundant crops of delicious, healthy blueberries for many years. To get the most from your bushes, it's really important to give them a prune each year - do it in February or March, before the plant gets busy growing.

How to Prune Blueberry Bushes. For the first 4 years or so after planting, there is no need to prune blueberry bushes. From then on, pruning is needed to stimulate growth of the new shoots that will bear fruit the following season. Prune plants in late winter or early spring before new growth begins.

Pruning and training Blueberries fruit on short sideshoots produced during spring or early summer of the previous year. They can also form fruit buds on the second flush growth produced later in the summer, at the tips of strong shoots. Pruning is rarely needed in the first two years, just remove any crossing or misplaced branches.

Pruning has long been recognized as a beneficial cultural practice in blueberry growing. Skillful pruning requires experience and growers generally develop their own style which may be slightly different from their neighbor's, but should accomplish the same objectives. The following text discusses some basic principles of pruning and provides a few suggestions and observations which may be helpful in determining how and when to prune blueberries in Florida.

Pruning is an investment in the future productivity of the blueberry planting. Regular annual pruning will spread costs throughout the life of the planting, ensure stable production from year to year, and serve as a useful tool for managing pests, fruit load, and quality.

(7). Oil burning is the most commonly practiced pruning procedure, and is employed on an estimated 80% of Maine's commercial blueberry acreage (9). Maine blueberry growers use an estimated 1,000,000 gallons of fuel oil annually to prune approximately 25,000 - acres (5).

Annual dormant pruning of highbush blueberry plants is needed to prevent overbearing, maintain plant vigor, and enhance fruit quality and earliness. Dormant pruning should begin during the late winter when flower buds are readily visible and should be completed before petal fall.

Depending on the variety you buy, you may need two plants for pollination and fruit production. If you don't have the space, consider self-pollinating varieties such as Blueberry Burst or Biloxi. Pruning of blueberries is not absolutely necessary, but light trimming can take place at almost any time during the growing season.

To keep them producing well, blueberry bushes need to be pruned every year. If your bushes have never been trimmed, be careful not to go overboard the first year: Remove no more than two or three of the oldest canes (more than seven years old). Remove any diseased or broken wood, plus crossing branches.

Setting out new plants --Always prune or rub off all flower buds and cut back 1/2 to 2/3 of the height at the time of planting. For potted plants, gently separate and spread out the roots so that the root mass is no longer in the shape of a pot. Remove all flower buds 12
