Child Care Subsidy and the Inclusion Support Programme - Fact Sheet. The Inclusion Support Programme is funded by the Australian Government Department of Education and Training – August 2018 Page 1 of 3. From 2 July 2018, under the new Child Care Package, child care services seeking to access ISP support must certify that the child or children the service is seeking to include meets the eligibility requirements specified in the ISP Guidelines.

Towards Financial Inclusion in India is a treatise on 'inclusion of the Last, the Lost and the Least'.
